Attendance matters

Attendance is an incredibly important part of ensuring the continued academic success of our students. We look forward to your continued support.

Here is a reminder about the expectations of attendance for the next school year.

Late Arrivals

Parents and carers, we need your help encouraging your child to leave home in sufficient time to ensure that they arrive to school by 8:30am to avoid being late! Students arriving between 8:40am – 9:00am must go to their form class to be registered.

Students arriving after 9:00am

Students arriving after 9:00am will go directly to Student Services to sign in before receiving a late slip. Arrivals after 9:30am will be classed as unauthorised absences which could lead to a Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) being issued. The threshold for a FPN is 10 sessions (a session is half a day) of unauthorised absence in a rolling period of 10 school weeks.

Please Note:

Absences can only be authorised by the school. Calling the school informs us of why your child is absent and the school will decide which code is appropriate. Medical evidence will need to be provided in order to avoid receiving a FPN before or after a school holiday.

Back gate

Please note, the back gate on Crescent Road shuts at 8:40am until the end of the school day. Students who arrive after 8:40am will be asked to walk around to the front entrance on Hemington Avenue.

Punctuality to lessons

In order to maximise learning time it is vital that students are punctual to their lessons. Poor punctuality to lessons is very disruptive to learning. If you have a text from the pastoral team explaining that your child was late to any lessons, please take the time to speak to your child about the importance of this.

Monitoring your child's attendance on Firefly

To help you keep track of your child/children's attendance, you can monitor attendance, lates, authorised and unauthorised absences on Firefly.

Attendance procedures

If your child has a cough or a cold, please send them to school with tissues and a water bottle. We will contact home and offer a paracetamol if required.

If your child is sick and unable to attend school, please call student services before 8:45am.

If your child has a medical appointment during the day, please inform student services of the appointment in advance and supply them with a copy of the appointment letter/appointment card. **Missing registration should be avoided.**

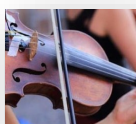

Standing Firm in Power and Pride by Samantha, 7B

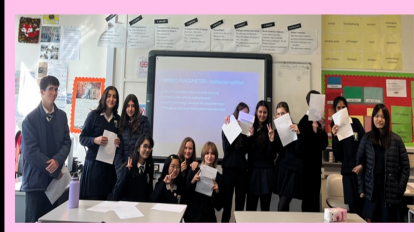
Every one of us can show that strength in our own way. Maybe it's by standing up for a friend, learning from the past, or simply choosing kindness when anger would be easier.

Day of the Dead



In the week leading up to half term, we celebrated **Día de los Muertos – the Day of the Dead**. Bringing a taste of Mexican culture, with music, colour, and sugar skulls. Our main feature was a **Catrina display**. As the week went on, the display was enriched with **paper marigolds and origami butterflies** crafted by students during our main celebration on 17 October. Everyone had the chance to explore the meaning behind this tradition, which in 2008 was recognised by **UNESCO** as a masterpiece of the *Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity*.

Movember: Raising Awareness for Men's Mental Health

This November, our school proudly supported Movember, a global campaign that shines a light on men's health, especially mental wellbeing. Mental health deserves the same care as physical health, yet research shows that many men are less likely to speak openly or seek help when struggling.

To support the cause, we hosted a two-part event. First, students took part in an open conversation, hosted by Mr Robinson, exploring the origins of Movember, its mission, and the importance of breaking the stigma around men's mental health.



Afterwards, everyone enjoyed a fun photo booth, complete with real and fake moustaches, to spark discussion and raise awareness. Thank you to everyone who got involved and helped show that it's always okay to ask for help.



Year 11 at Poetry Live!



On 28 November, Year 11 students visited the London Apollo Theatre for 'Poetry Live!', an event that brought their GCSE Literature texts to life. Poets including Simon Armitage, John Agard and Carol Ann Duffy performed their work and shared insights into the ideas and experiences behind their writing.

A lively Q&A gave students the chance to ask their own questions—two from FBS—which ranged from themes and techniques to the challenges of writing (and even a request for a selfie). The day ended with a chief examiner's session offering valuable exam tips.

Overall, the trip was engaging, informative and confidence-boosting, as students prepare for next year's GCSE English Literature exams. ***Thank you to the Jack Petchey Foundation who funded this trip.***

Young City Poets 2025

Alongside regular workshops with me about 'all things poetry', the group attended a site visit to Tower Bridge on 2nd October 2025. During our visit, students were treated to a personalised tour of the venue, as well the opportunity to participate in a tailor-made workshop.

Using inspiration from the trip, students are currently working on poems inspired by these individual objects, as well as the city itself. Final submissions will be due 16 January 2026. I look forward to reading their drafts and seeing their final pieces. Winter Lights Writing Competition

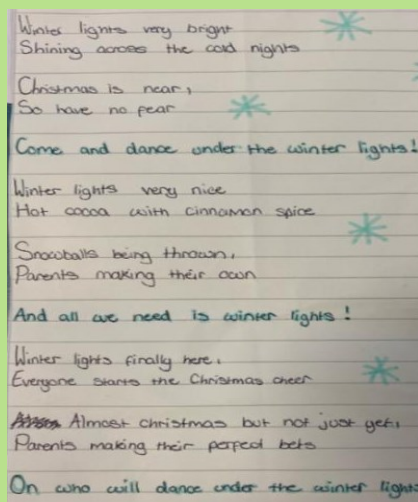

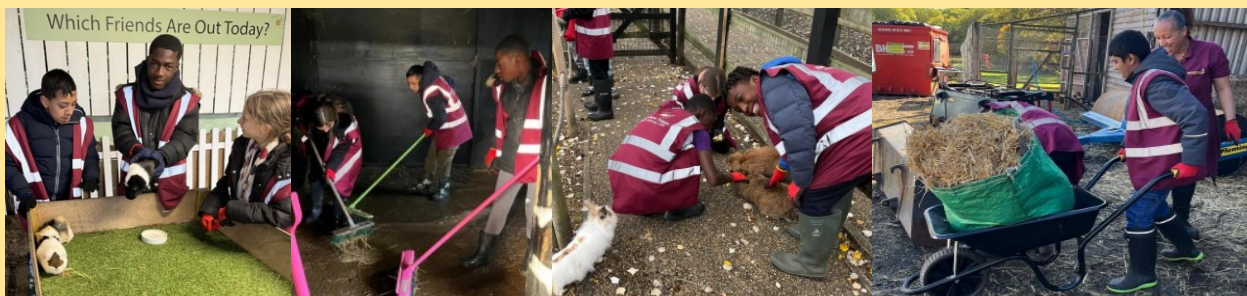


Year 7 trip to GoApe

PE

The PE Department is proud to celebrate another successful term of increasing girls' participation in sport. This term, we have expanded our range of girls' only clubs to ensure every student has the opportunity to participate, grow in confidence, and discover new talents. Our Thursday club is currently running with our highest numbers yet with nearly 30 students consistently turning up and we want to keep building on this!

We have taken a number of students to a top level women's football match between Arsenal and Chelsea; we took 30 students to the game which ended in a 1-1 draw! It was a fantastic experience and the students really enjoyed the day out!

The year 7 and year 8 combined girls netball team lost out in a close game against Ark Pioneer losing 6-4, the year 9 team played their first ever netball fixture losing 16-6 to a strong and experienced Ark Pioneer team. We have also taken a girls' indoor athletics team to Ashmole where the year 7 girls' team finished in 3rd place overall winning a bronze medal.

Our KS4 Badminton girls' team (another new team started this term) played against the current defending champions in the borough, St Michael's, where the students worked incredibly hard but lost out to a strong team. Our KS3 Badminton team came out eventual winners against Hasmane after drawing 3-3 in games it was decided on points scored (83-71 in FBS' favour).

Our year 7's girls and our year 8/9 teams braved the rainy weather and muddy pitches as both teams travelled to Ark Pioneer to compete in a football match. The year 7 girls lost out in their first ever football match 6-0 but all worked incredibly hard and enjoyed the experience. Our year 8/9 team ran out 4-1 winners and played a fantastic game against strong opposition.

Moving into the new term we will continue to promote girls in sport and have already started planning a number of fixtures against different schools.

On 8 November 30 students attended the highly anticipated Arsenal v Chelsea WSL game which saw the League Champions face off against the European Champions at The Emirates Stadium.

We did not get off to a flying start however, as thousands of fans were stuck outside the stadium at kick off, due to turnstile problems. We just missed the first goal scored by Chelsea, but then watched a fabulous game of football where Arsenal tried everything they could looking for an equaliser, which eventually came in the 80th minute. With 10 minutes remaining, Arsenal then pushed for a winner, and did have the ball in the net, but it was ruled out for a very close offside decision. The game finished 1-1.

Overall, we had a fabulous time watching the game, where it was the first time many students had attended a professional game. Some students were hardcore Arsenal fans, and arrived wearing scarves!

We will look to repeat this trip in future to give the opportunity for all students to attend a professional football match, maybe even at a vastly superior stadium down the road.



Able and Ambitious

This term is always an exciting one as we begin the nomination process for the Able and Ambitious cohort for the year ahead. This year marks a significant milestone, with a record number of over 170 students across Years 7–11 inducted into the programme.

In November, we officially launched the programme by celebrating last year's successes and sharing our plans for the year ahead. Last month, our new Year 7 Able and Ambitious cohort visited the Science Museum. During the trip, students explored key scientific concepts such as friction, electricity, and magnetism, while also enjoying the wide range of interactive exhibits on display. The students thoroughly enjoyed the day and returned with a greater understanding of the world around them.

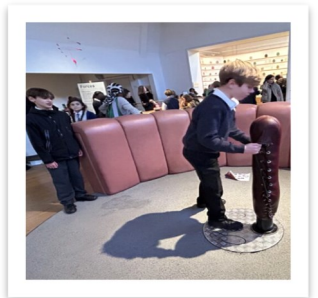
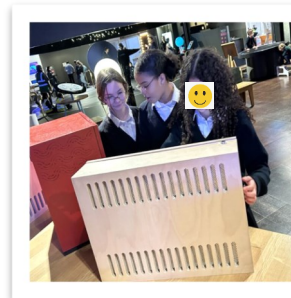

STEM

There's only one way to find out what it's like to work in a tech role: have a go at the job yourself! This is what our top set Maths year 8 students did, when they joined the STEM Skills Fair at the Science Museum, on Tuesday, 24 November.

First, they created a personalised bracelet based on binary number recognition and understanding. Students converted their own birth date into binary code, made of colours representing ones and zeros, and crafted a unique beaded bracelet that revealed their digital identity. This interactive session combined computer language understanding with hands-on personalised coding. This was Tamzin's account after decoding "for every zero, you put a white bead, and for every one you put a red bead, which was interesting and my favourite activity."

Then they learnt about the metrology masterclass, which is all about how not to lose weight! Scientists at the stand explained that, historically, the kilogram was defined by a physical artifact, known as 'Le Grand K', housed near Paris. However, this artifact was found to change mass slightly over time. In 2019, to overcome this problem, mass was linked to electrical quantities. Students, therefore, were able to increase and decrease the number of electrical quantities with a mechanical handle to reach the balance that would define a kilogram. In other words, they were 'creating' their own kilogram! This is Asa's report on his experience "It was amazing, interesting and informative! When electricity flowed around through the wire it created an upwards force which got stronger when you increased the current and could lift stuff. They used this to measure exactly how heavy a weight is."

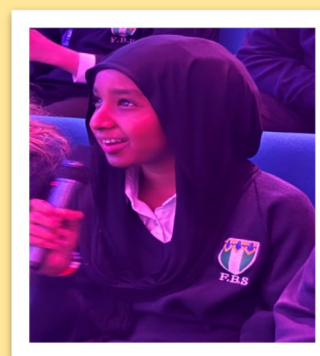
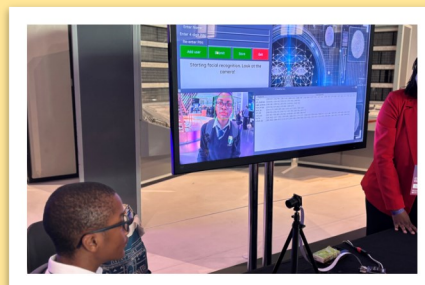
After that, there were another five stands to explore...

At the Coachmaker's stand, students had opportunities to dismantle and re-assemble a standard electrical plug, and at the Design Challenge stand, students were offered valuable digital design skills and a scan code to take part in the Queen Elizabeth Prize for Engineering. Some students had a go at it and designed their own Trophy.

But the most intriguing stand of them all was the one called 'Can you break the Bank?' It's there where students discovered how computers are programmed to recognise facial features and some of them were able to guess secret PIN numbers of their peers without triggering the security alarm. A real breakthrough!

After the Fair Skills, our students, together with students from another school, put questions to a Board of three scientists. The questions asked by our students were so relevant and interesting and showed a genuine interest in a STEM career. They wanted to know what the typical day was, the working hours, the challenges of their job, what was their biggest achievement, if they were always good at science and maths at school, what was their route into their career, how was their apprenticeship/university course, what they were asked at their job interview, how was their first day at work, what's the impact of what they do, how they overcome a challenge, what advice they had for a student who is interested in a STEM career and other impressive questions.

The conclusive account comes from Sirin "The trip to the science museum was very exciting and interesting. I liked it because we got to learn about how maths and science are used in many things like robotics and in video game algorithms. We had a great trip, and we learned many things we didn't know about maths and science before and most importantly, we had a great time."

Trips

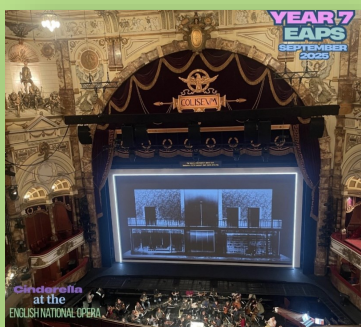

The canteen is open at the following times:

Breakfast: 8.15am – 8.40am

Break: 11.00am – 11.20am

Lunch: Key Stage 3: 12.20pm - 12.55pm and Key Stage 4: 1.20pm - 1.55pm

Topping up lunch accounts - school dinner money needs to be added via ParentPay before 10.30am to allow students to be able to buy lunch on the same day. We recommend topping up over the weekend as ParentPay can be busy on Monday mornings sometimes causing delays with payments.

Just a reminder, when making payments can we ask you not to use the 'One click' payment method as this can take up to 7 days to clear which then delays money going onto your child's lunch account. The best way is to add money to the basket and check out using 'Other Payment Methods'.

Daily spend limit— there is a default daily spend limit of £3.50 and no food costing above that limit can be bought. This limit can only be changed by emailing school@friern.barnet.sch.uk

Students on Free School Meals can spend up to £2.86 a day. Parents/Carers are welcome to top up their lunch accounts.

Help - if your child needs help with their pin code, finger print or they have been told they do not have sufficient funds on their account, please remind them to come to the main office so we can help them as we do not want anyone to go hungry.
