Attendance

Attendance matters

Attendance is an incredibly important part of ensuring the continued academic success of our students. We look forward to your continued support.

Here is a reminder about the expectations of attendance for the next school year.

Late Arrivals

Parents and carers, we need your help encouraging your child to leave home in sufficient time to ensure that they arrive to school by 8:30am to avoid being late! Students arriving between 8:40am – 9:00am must go to their form class to be registered.

Students arriving after 9:00am

Students arriving after 9:00am will go directly to Student Services to sign in before receiving a late slip. Arrivals after 9:30am will be classed as unauthorised absences which could lead to a Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) being issued. The threshold for a FPN is 10 sessions (a session is half a day) of unauthorised absence in a rolling period of 10 school weeks.

Please Note:

Absences can only be authorised by the school. Calling the school informs us of why your child is absent and the school will decide which code is appropriate. Medical evidence will need to be provided in order to avoid receiving a FPN before or after a school holiday.

Back gate

Please note, the back gate on Crescent Road shuts at 8:40am until the end of the school day. Students who arrive after 8:40am will be asked to walk around to the front entrance on Hemington Avenue.

Punctuality to lessons

In order to maximise learning time it is vital that students are punctual to their lessons. Poor punctuality to lessons is very disruptive to learning. If you have a text from the pastoral team explaining that your child was late to any lessons, please take the time to speak to your child about the importance of this.

Monitoring your child's attendance on Firefly

To help you keep track of your child/children's attendance, you can monitor attendance, lates, authorised and unauthorised absences on Firefly.

Attendance procedures

If your child has a cough or a cold, please send them to school with tissues and a water bottle. We will contact home and offer a paracetamol if required.

If your child is sick and unable to attend school, please call student services before 8:45am.

If your child has a medical appointment during the day, please inform student services of the appointment in advance and supply them with a copy of the appointment letter/appointment card. **Missing registration should be avoided.**

Young City Poets 2024/2025



Young City Poets is the National Literacy Trust's annual poetry writing programme, which helps to inspire students to write poetry of their own, based on the city around them and a specific iconic London cultural venue. Over the course of the programme, students met to write together, learn about poetry from their teacher and a professional poet, visit a venue in London, all culminating in some of their poems being published in an anthology to be shared nationwide and a performance at St Paul's Cathedral.

Selected Year 7 students from FBS participated in the programme this year, which commenced in January. Alongside regular workshops with me about 'all things poetry', the group attended a site visit to Tower Bridge. During our visit, students were treated to a guided tour of the museum, as well the opportunity to walk across the glass walkway, if they dared! Using inspiration from the trip, students went away and worked on poems inspired by this iconic landmark, as well as the city itself.

I rise with dawn, though I've never slept, My tired bones in silence wept. Steel and stone, rust and chain, I bear the weight, I take the strain.







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

A few weeks and a few poem drafts later, the group participated in a workshop with Paul Cree, a professional poet. Paul challenged students to think about including more personal responses in their poems, and he was really impressed by the dedication and creativity on display.

The main event to celebrate students' efforts was a performance at London's iconic St Paul's Cathedral. Four brave students stood up in front of a large audience to perform their poems beautifully.

In post-visit workshops, students engaged with writing activities, which helped to ignite ideas and suggest alternatives for those who had the dreaded writers' block! Alongside the workshops, students did a lot of independent writing, which is commendable.

This second volume of our anthology is like a moonlit reflection, glowing with the energy and support these young writers bring into our shared space. They are the quiet pull of the tides—attentive, receptive, and ever-present in their willingness to listen, read, and offer feedback that is both honest and encouraging. Their ability to help each other rise, much like the moon's influence on the ocean's ebb and flow, creates an atmosphere where creativity can expand and contract freely, offering room for growth while maintaining a steady orbit of support.

What you'll discover within these pages is a selection of the brilliant work these students have crafted through our discussions and feedback. Some pieces seem to respond to one another, as if the words are caught in a shared gravitational pull, creating a dialogue that deepens the collective experience. Our weekly sessions were like the waxing and waning of the moon itself - moments of sharp insight, illuminating bursts of inspiration, and, yes, the occasional hum of the dreaded brutal edit klaxon breaking the stillness! But like the steady pull of the moon, these students have remained committed to their craft, their community, and their growth.

The Politics of Play – gaming workshop at FBS

On Monday 7 July, a group of selected students took part in a unique and inspiring researchbased workshop led by Dr Alison Croasdale, a lecturer from the UCL Institute of Education. Chosen due to their GCSE option choices or teacher recommendations, students spent time exploring how videogame design can be used to express their views on real-world issues in creative and meaningful ways. The workshop, part of a wider research project into creativity and learning in schools, encouraged students to think critically, collaborate, and develop ideas that crossed curriculum boundaries including English, computing, media studies, and art/ design.

The workshop not only enhanced students' media literacy—an increasingly vital skill for employability and academic success - but also gave them the chance to contribute to cutting-edge educational research. Under teacher supervision, students were invited to share their reflections through short interviews, offering valuable insights into how creative digital projects can support learning.

We are incredibly proud of how engaged and thoughtful our students were throughout the session and look forward to seeing how these kinds of opportunities can continue to enrich their education.



Novel:

Groundwater by Thomas McMullan



John and Liz have left the city behind to move to a remote house on the shores of the lake. Though the house is barely unpacked, Liz's sister, with her children and her husband, have come to visit for the August bank holiday weekend.


Over the course of a hot, slow weekend, tensions simmer; things go unsaid – between the two couples, between the two sisters. Their time together is punctured by visits from Jim, the solitary local warden for the area; and a group of students camping nearby draw closer and closer, finally infiltrating the house – and bringing their own tensions and hierarchies with them.

As the weekend draws to a close, the landscape reveals a violence that has long lain hidden – and the summer builds to its harrowing climax.

Taut and menacing, full of disquiet and tenderness, Groundwater is about the gulfs that lie between us and those we love – and the miraculous ways our deepest desires and fears manifest.

Short story collection:

After A Dance by Bridget O'Conno



Bridget O'Connor was one of the great short story writers of her generation. She had a voice that was viscerally funny and an eye for both the glaring reality and the absurdity of the everyday.

In After A Dance, we meet a selection of O'Connor's most memorable characters often living on the margin of their own lives: from the anonymous thief set on an unusual prize to the hungover best man clinging to what he's lost, to the unrepentant gold-digger who always comes out on top. From unravelling narcissists to melancholy romantics all human life is here - at its best and at its delightful worst.

The Elis and John podcast, hosted by Elis James and John Robins, is a comedy show featuring banter, games, and discussions on various topics. Highlights include "Cymru Connection," where Elis tries to find a connection with Welsh callers, and "John's Shame Well", where John absolves listeners of their deepest shames.

Non-Fiction:

The Unthinkable: A Story of Control, Violence and my Mother by David Challen



One Saturday in 2010, David's mother struck more than twenty blows to the back of her husband's head with a hammer after thirty years of abuse. She then washed the dirty dishes from the lunch she had just cooked and left the house. In those few minutes, David's life was changed forever.

Over the next decade, he led the fight to overturn her conviction; and in doing so he not only freed his mother and helped change the legal system, but also became a voice for the countless victims of coercive control across the country.

This is a powerful story of a son's love for his mother; of an insidious form of abuse that must be better understood if we are to truly tackle it; and fight that reshaped how society understands domestic abuse.1

Our annual farm visit took place on 10 June. Nine pupils came to experience the countryside and food production first hand.

The pupils were introduced to how fruit and vegetables are grown, being brave enough to try raw asparagus, rhubarb and gooseberries amongst others. They were surprised to see where potatoes came from – actually grown underground.

Next was egg production, feeding chickens by hand and collecting eggs which were later cooked at lunch. A visit to the pig paddocks followed where one of our sows 'Annie' had recently given birth and for a while allowed her piglets to be handled until she got a bit grumpy and we had to bail out.

Goats were fed and cattle were given apples. The size of the cows took a few by surprise as did how much poo came out the back end of them with no warning! However, then some were brave enough to help us spray the cows for flies – the flies get rather bothersome at this time of year so we herded up the cows and put them through the cattle race – a sort of tunnel of bars to keep them in place but keeping them and us safe from harm and the pupils sprayed the chemical along the cows backs expertly for first timers.

Honey production followed with the pupils trying honey straight from the comb and Mr Davies taking the plunge with a bee suit in with a hive,

Burgers were superbly made and cooked over an open fire by Shane with some helping hands: A fried egg in a burger was new experience for some.

We were very impressed with how the pupils dived in and really got involved.



Science

Energy Quest Comes to Friern Barnet School!!!

On 10 June our year 7 and 8 students learned to think like engineers. Energy Quest, delivered by Engineering UK, challenged students to define problems, test solutions, create prototypes and share their findings - discovering that engineering is about much more than building things.

What Happened on the Day

Students experienced the full engineering process through two hands-on challenges that required them to work like professional engineering teams.

Defining the Problem: Each challenge began with students identifying exactly what they needed to solve. For the phone charging challenge, they had to understand how to generate electrical current. For the water filtration challenge, they needed to figure out how to remove contaminants effectively.

Testing and Creating: Students built prototypes using apples, coins, and nails for phone chargers, and everyday backpack items for water filters. When their first attempts didn't work perfectly, they tested different approaches, modified their designs, and tried again - just like real engineers do.

Sharing Solutions: Teams presented their creations to each other, explaining what worked, what didn't, and what they learned. This sharing process helped everyone understand that there are multiple ways to solve engineering problems.

What Students Gained

Students discovered that engineering isn't about having all the answers - it's about having a process for finding solutions. They learned to:

- Break down complex problems into manageable parts
- Test ideas quickly and learn from what doesn't work
- Collaborate effectively by sharing different perspectives and skills
- Communicate solutions clearly to others
- Iterate and improve their designs based on feedback

Research shows that 72% of students better understand what engineers do after Energy Quest, but more importantly, they develop transferable skills they can use in any subject or future career.

Looking Forward

The problem-solving process students experienced during Energy Quest will continue to benefit them across all their learning. We'll build on these skills by encouraging students to define problems clearly, test their ideas, and share their thinking in other subjects too.

Students now understand that being an engineer means being curious, persistent, and collaborative - qualities that will serve them well whatever path they choose.



Bletchley Park A&A trip on 8 July



Mr White and Ms Bachelor took part in one of the decoding workshops at Bletchley Park. Teachers and students had the opportunity to have a hands on experience with one of the Enigma machines.



Information from Bletchley Park website—In January 1940, Bletchley Park made the first British wartime break into the German Enigma cipher – greatly helped by information passed on by Polish cryptographers. However, that first break was only the beginning. Enigma was not a single machine, but a family of machines. Developed for commercial use in 1924, Enigma was adopted by German armed forces from 1926. Its original design was adapted for the German military, secret service and state, and used by Germany's allies. Each change posed a fresh challenge to the Codebreakers. These Enigma machines, held at Bletchley Park, represent some of the many types in use before and during WW2.




